Alternative medicine—is it for you? During April, we feature many selections from the vast literature on this phenomenon in our book display. What's the best way to approach the subject? If you start with a particular disease or ailment, chances are we can find you a book about natural or alternative treatments for it. Then, there are books that seek to educate the public on a more general level. For example, there's a new book out in large print called "Supplement Your Prescription: what your doctor doesn't know about nutrition," by Hyla Cass. Here's another intriguing title: "Pain-Free for Life: the 6-week cure for chronic pain without surgery or drugs" by Scott Brady. Who doesn't want to be pain-free? The Mayo Clinic published its own guide to a whole range of natural therapies, including massage, acupuncture, and meditation. There are links between alternative medicine, religion, culture, and ethnicity. In "Earth Medicine - Earth Food" by Michael A. Weiner, you can read about the different plant remedies used by generations of North American Indians. Is it all hype, or is there really something valid here that you should know about? 

"Ignoring Forensic Evidence" Talk by Dr. Jerry Labriola

Book signing - *Scent of Danger* April 5th, 7:00p.m.



Critically acclaimed mystery writer Dr. Jerry Labriola, author of the Dr. David Brooks mystery series and co-author with renowned forensic scientist Dr. Henry Lee of *The Budapest Connection, Shocking Cases, Dr. Henry Lee's Forensic Files,* and *Famous Crimes Revisited,* and has penned another thriller in which world-class action, violence and sinister cover-ups abound.

In *Scent of Danger*, American international treasure hunter Paul D'Arneau investigates the theft of a secret perfume formula - only to be swept up in a maelstrom of cryptic

messages, personal assaults – and even murder! The formula dates back to the days of Napoleon, the discovery of the Rosetta Stone, the controversy over the Elgin Marbles, and, possibly – Cleopatra. Hastily planned journeys from Paris to Grasse, France – the perfume capital of the world – and to Cairo, Alexandria, London and the islands of Elba and St. Helena heighten the suspense. Also woven throughout the story is a romance between Paul and Sylvie Ranet, of the French Academy of Sciences.

In conjunction with the release of this latest mystery/ suspense novel, Dr. Labriola presents a talk entitled "Ignoring Forensic Evidence" in the library auditorium Tuesday, April 5th at 7:00 p.m., in which he will discuss two high-profile cases taken from books he coauthored with Dr. Lee. In both cases the victims died from a gunshot wound into the mouth. One case was ruled a murder and the other a suicide, Labriola offers forensic evidence refuting the decisions of both juries.

The talk will be followed by a question and answer period as well as the sale and signing of *Scent of Danger*. Those purchasing it will receive a complimentary copy of one of Labriola's earlier books.

The program is free and open to the public.



Autobiography of Mark Twain, Volume I - the book Twain wanted published a century after his death - made headlines and became an instant bestseller when it was released late last year. In it, Twain said he had hit on the perfect idea for writing a biography: to "start it at no particular time of your life; talk only about the thing that interests you for the moment; drop it

the moment its interest threatens to pale, and turn your talk upon the new and more interesting thing that has intruded itself into your mind meantime."

Steve Courtney, award-winning biographer and Publicist and Publications Editor at The Mark Twain House & Museum, will speak in the library auditorium Thursday, April 7, at 6:30 p.m. on the story of this extraordinary work and the many funny, touching and sometimes angry tales contained therein. Courtney will also speak of the connection between the *Autobiography* and the life of the Mark Twain's closes friend believe it or not, a minister from Southington. Courtney is the author of "*Joseph Hopkins Twichell: The Life and Times of Mark Twain's Closest Friend*" (University of Georgia Press, 2008), which won the Connecticut Book Award for Biography/Memoir in 2009.

Copies of both the Twain *Autobiography* and the Twichell biography will be available for purchase and signing after the talk.

The program is open to the public. Admission is free.
